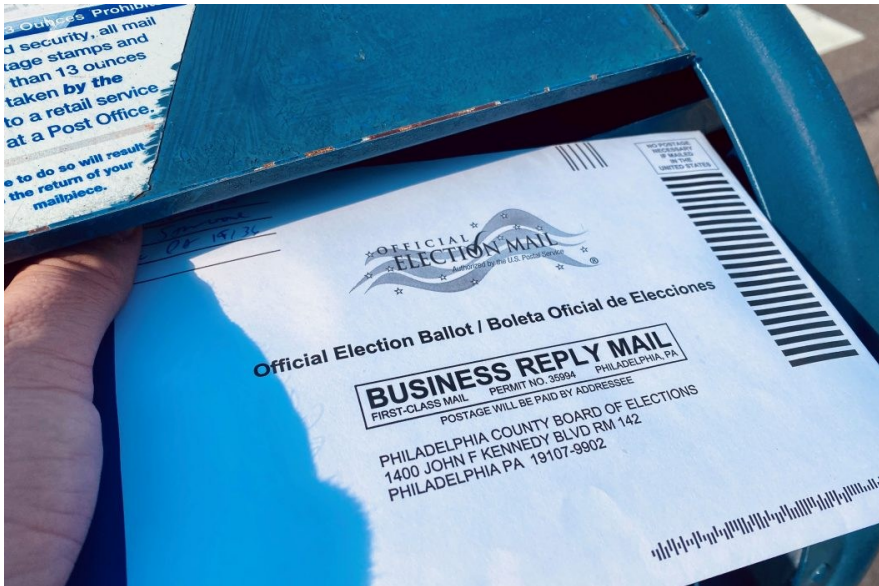

Does the president have the authority to unilaterally interfere with how Americans vote?

The U.S. Supreme Court issued an emergency order Monday August 24th that allows the Trump administration to move forward for now with plans to restrict mail-in voting ahead of the midterm elections. It's a ruling opponents say would bring chaos to the election process only days before ballots in some states are mailed out.

The ruling allows the administration to proceed with an executive order President Trump signed in March directing the U.S. Postal Service to determine which voters should receive mail-in ballots. It also directs the Department of Homeland Security to build a database of U.S. citizens who are eligible to vote.

There are two lawsuits that are challenging the president's executive order about mail-in ballots. The Supreme Court decision August 24th, 2026 had to do with a group of states that sued, while the other case that was brought by the League of Women Voters.

The Supreme Court's ruling only applied to the states' lawsuit, and it only said that the states had sued too early because they brought their lawsuit before the U.S. Postal Service issued their final rule, which, of course, they did Friday, August 21st. So it was, I think, a win for President Trump, but a very time-limited one.



It didn't say anything about whether the underlying executive order is lawful. It didn't say anything about whether the new Postal Service rule is lawful. That issue is now going to be litigated probably pretty quickly in both of the cases that are back before Judge Talwani in Boston.

The executive order is not in effect and the USPS rule is not in effect, is still the status quo. All the Supreme Court did Monday was pause one of the two injunctions against the executive order. There's still a second injunction blocking the executive order from going into effect. The rule itself says it can't go into effect until that injunction too is no longer in effect.

The Supreme Court ruling said in a quote "Time will tell if the presidents executive order was lawful".





I would like to begin by expressing my gratitude to our stewards for their outstanding efforts in representing our members. Despite the daily challenges we face with certain managers, we remain committed to addressing these issues and bringing positive attitudes.

I do want to talk about this heat. We need to stand up for our rights and not be afraid to speak up against some managers with bad judgment who engage in harassment and intimidation. If management for any reason harasses, intimidates, or even threatens you with any dehydration discipline or any on-the-job injuries, **you need to contact your steward or us immediately at 210-744-2602.** If you do happen to dehydrate at any point on your route, you must file an **on-the-job injury.** Request a CA-17 for a traumatic injury and a CA-16 and go see a doctor, you also have the right to choose your own Doctor. Then you will have to file a CA-1 on ECOMP. Please register and file the CA-1.

National and Local elections season is approaching, and your ballot will arrive at your home by mail. Please take the time to vote for the candidate you believe will best strengthen our Union. You will receive a ballot with instructions on how to complete it, and ballots are scheduled to be mailed out in mid-September. I encourage every member to exercise their rights and vote.

We have four candidates running: **James Henry (CLC), Lew Drass, Michael Caref, and Nicole Rhine.** Remember, if you choose not to exercise your rights and vote, you give up your right to complain. Just saying!

I would also like to address an important matter regarding uniforms. Management will begin if they haven't already ensured that all carriers are wearing the proper shoes and full uniform. Please make sure that any carrier who receives a uniform allowance uses it to obtain the correct footwear.

We are the face of the USPS, and maintaining a professional appearance is essential. This includes wearing the proper uniform items and approved baseball caps. We do not need unnecessary Letters of Warning, so please wear the uniform with pride and in full compliance. I also understand that the uniform has gotten so expensive just do your very best to wear the proper uniform.

If any member needs to contact the office for any reason, please call me directly at **210-744-2602**, as we no longer have a secretary available to answer the phones. I am available Monday through Saturday at any time. I kindly ask you do not call on Sundays, as that is my designated rest day. Thank you.

Ballots for NALC national election to be mailed in September

Elections for national business agents (NBAs) in Regions 3, 4 and 5 are unnecessary, as each had a single nominee. The following were elected by acclamation for NBA in those regions: Region 3—Ronny Morgan, Region 4—John Robles, and Region 5—David Teegarden.

The election will be conducted by mail ballot in accordance with the *NALC Constitution* and applicable federal law. Under the oversight of the National Election Committee, the American Arbitration Association will prepare, print and mail the ballots and tabulate the votes.

On or about Sept. 28, ballots will be mailed to all eligible voters. Official election instructions will be included with all ballots. To be eligible to vote, a person must be a member of NALC in good standing as of June 1, 2026. Any member who does not receive a ballot by Oct. 5 should contact the NALC Membership Department to request a replacement ballot. The Membership Department can be reached by telephone at 202-393-4695. The deadline to contact the Membership Department is 4 p.m. Eastern time on Oct 9.

To be counted, ballots must be received by noon on Oct. 19. The counting of ballots will begin that day or the next.

Federal Retirement Fairness Act (H.R. 1522)

Many federal employees, including Postal Service employees, begin their public service in non-career positions before transitioning to career status. These employees, including many letter carriers, do not receive retirement credit for their time spent in these positions. Because years employed as a non-career employee are not creditable under the Federal Employees Retirement System (FERS), employees who started in non-career positions and transition to career status must work longer to reach the required years of employment to receive full retirement benefits.

More than 65 percent of the current letter carrier craft began their USPS careers as casuals, transitional employees (TEs) or city carrier assistants (CCAs), all of which are non-career positions. Commonly, previous CCAs spent two-plus years in this position before converting to career status. Previous casuals and TEs often worked in non-career positions much longer.

More than 132,000 letter carriers who started in non-career positions, in most cases doing the exact same work as career employees, have time that is currently not creditable toward their retirement and would benefit from this bill.

The Federal Retirement Fairness Act would modify what is considered creditable federal civilian service under FERS. This bill would allow these employees to make catch-up retirement contributions for time spent as non-career employees after Dec. 31, 1988, making such time creditable service under the FERS, and for other purposes.

This legislation would allow letter carriers and other affected employees the opportunity to purchase retirement credit for the time they spent in these non-career positions, providing greater retirement security.

NALC supports this bill, which would benefit more than 65 percent of current letter carriers by allowing them to make catch-up retirement contributions for time spent as non-career employees, making it creditable service under FERS.

The Responsibility of Union Leadership

Accepting a position as a union officer or steward is more than taking on a title. It is a commitment to serve the membership, uphold the principles of the union, and accept responsibility for representing coworkers fairly and effectively. Whether elected as an officer or appointed or elected as a steward, the position carries an obligation to put the interests of the membership and the union ahead of personal differences and individual agendas.

Union officers are entrusted with the business and direction of the organization. Depending on the office, their responsibilities may include attending meetings, maintaining records, managing finances, communicating with members, enforcing the union's constitution and bylaws, and ensuring that decisions made by the membership are carried out. Officers should come prepared, participate actively, and understand the duties of their position. Accepting an office means accepting the work that comes with it—not simply holding the title.

Union stewards serve on the front line of representation. They are often the first people members turn to when they have questions, workplace concerns, or believe their contractual rights have been violated. A steward must listen carefully, investigate the facts, understand the collective bargaining agreement, communicate with management when appropriate, and ensure that contractual rights are protected. When grievances are necessary, they must be handled accurately and within established time limits.

Both officers and stewards also have a responsibility to treat members fairly. Personal friendships, disagreements, personalities, or workplace politics should never determine who receives representation. Members should be able to approach their representatives knowing their concerns will be taken seriously and handled professionally.

These positions also require communication and accountability. Members deserve to know what their union is doing and why. Leaders should be willing to answer reasonable questions, explain decisions, attend meetings, participate training, and continually improve their knowledge of the contract and their responsibilities. No officer or steward will know everything on the first day, but every representative should be willing to learn.

Perhaps most importantly, serving the union means remembering who you represent. Leadership is not about authority over fellow members. It is about service to them. Sometimes that means having difficult conversations, challenging management, defending a member whose situation may be unpopular, or acknowledging when a mistake has been made. Good representation requires integrity, consistency, courage, and professionalism.

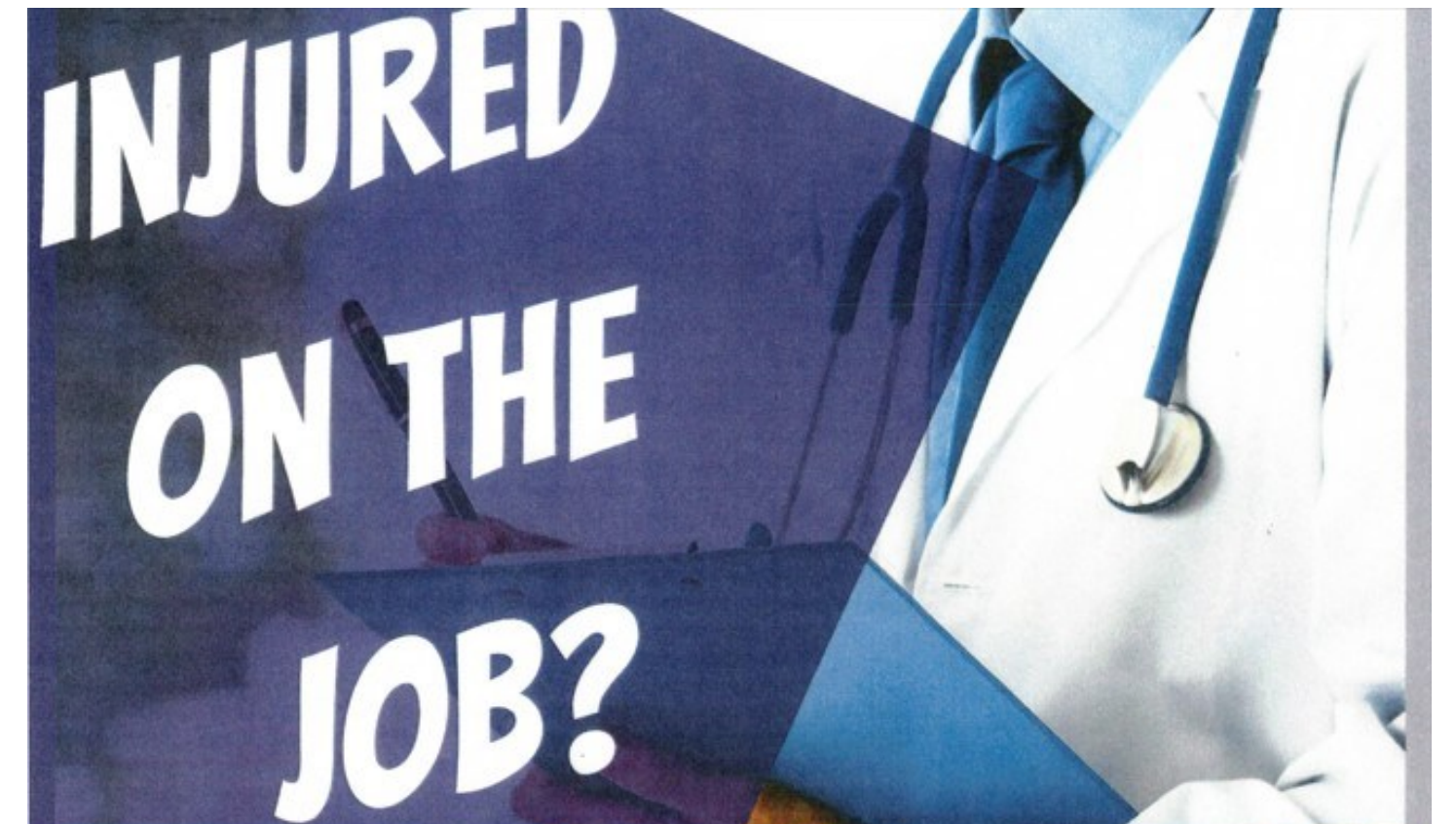
Before accepting an officer or steward position, every member should ask themselves whether they are willing to dedicate the necessary time and effort to perform the job properly. Our union is strongest when those who accept leadership positions understand that participation is not optional—it is part of the responsibility they accepted.

A strong union does not exist simply because we have officers, stewards, a contract, or a meeting hall. It exists because members are willing to step forward, accept responsibility, and do the work necessary to represent one another.

The title may identify the position, but dedication to the membership is what defines a union leader.

I encourage anyone wanting to run for an officer or steward to come forward and take those steps now. We need involvement and active leaders at all times. I myself will not be running in this coming election. Thank you for the opportunity to fulfill the role as an officer for branch 421 for 6 years. I've enjoyed my time. Good luck to everyone running!

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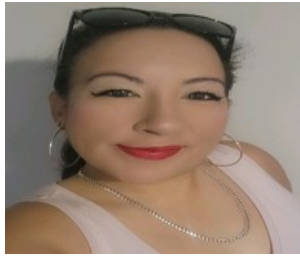

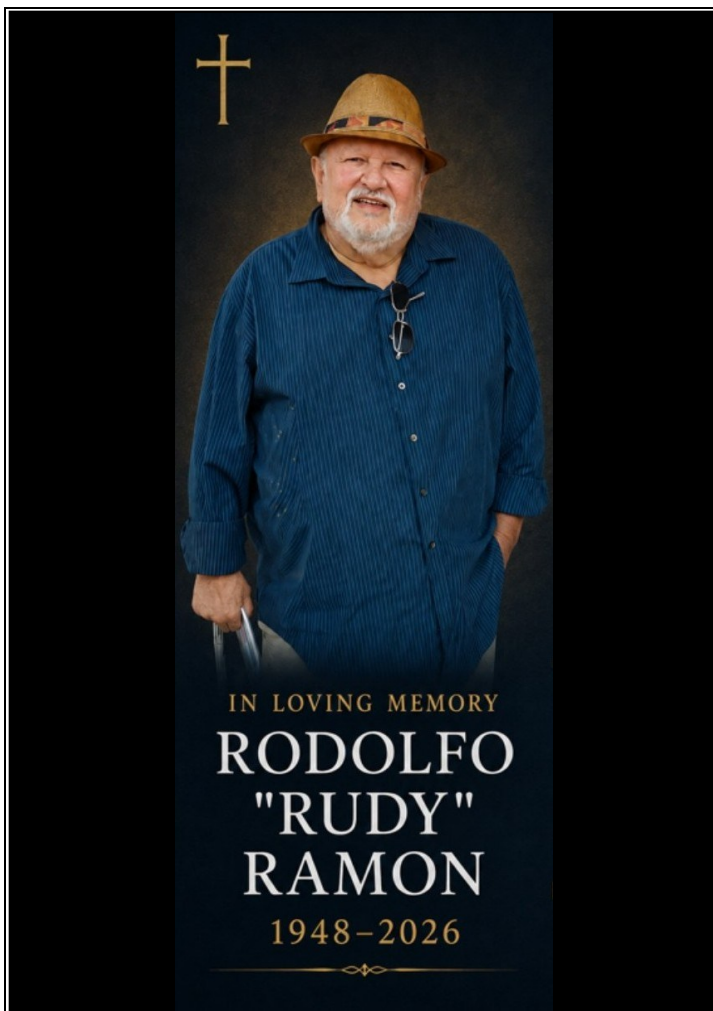

As a member of the NALC, there are several easy ways to give to the Letter Carrier Political Fund:

- Payroll deduction:** Contribute automatically, using PostalEase (either **online** or by **phone**) to set up an allotment deduction from your USPS paycheck.
- Direct bank withdrawal:** You can authorize the fund to withdraw a monthly electronic contribution directly from your personal checking account

Annuity deduction: Retired letter carriers can elect to give monthly via an automatic deduction from your monthly annuity.

Family Member Contribution: How immediate family members of NALC members contribute to the Letter Carrier Political Fund using Electronic Fund Transfer or by making a One-Time contribution
